1 Introduction

SQA Accreditation is the national accrediting body for Scotland with a statutory remit under Scottish legislation to accredit and quality assure qualifications in Scotland. Although part of the Scottish Qualifications Authority, SQA Accreditation is distinct and autonomous to SQA's awarding function.

SQA Accreditation sets and specifies the requirements for accrediting qualifications to safeguard and support the needs of learners, parents, funding bodies, employers, providers and Scottish Government. We do this by promoting and maintaining public confidence in accredited qualifications and approved awarding bodies.

This report summarises the qualification data that has been provided to us by approved awarding bodies. This information covers SQA accredited qualifications during the Q2 of 2018–19 (July to September 2018) and focuses on candidates who were:

- registered for an SQA accredited qualification
- certificated for an SQA accredited qualification

The data has been analysed in relation to:

- qualification type
- awarding body
- ♦ developer
- ◆ area of competence (ie classification)
- Workplace Core Skills



2 Accredited qualifications


At the end of quarter 2 of 2018–19 there were 847 live accredited qualifications¹:

- ◆ 545 SVQs (64.3%)
- ♦ 32 Regulatory and Licensing qualifications (3.8%)
- ◆ 270 'Other' qualifications (31.9%)



Compared to Q1, the total number of accredited qualifications has increased by six (equating to a 0.7% increase).

The number of qualifications in the past three years has remained relatively stable.



The number of accredited qualifications has remained relatively stable over the past three years.


2.1 Total candidate registrations and certifications

Registrations

27,153 candidates were registered for SQA accredited qualifications in Q2

4.7%

This is a 4.7% decrease compared to Q1.



2.2 Top Ten

The qualification was the highest number of both registrations and certifications was the **NEBOSH National General Certificate in Occupational Health and Safety.**

The NEBOSH National General Certificate in Occupational Health and Safety also had the highest number of registrations and certifications in Q1 of 2018–19. Compared to figures from Q1:

- Registrations for this qualification in Q2 were 22.8% lower than in Q1
- ♦ Certifications for this qualification in Q2 were 18.4% higher than in Q1

2.3 Registrations and certifications by qualification type


SVQs

- 11,041 registrations
- 9,882 certifications

Compared to Q2 of 2017–18, the number of SVQ registrations has decreased by 3.5%.

SVQ certifications in Q2 2018-19 are 5.6% lower

than those in Q2 of 2017-18.





Regulatory & Licensing (R&L)

- ♦ 3,835 Registrations
- ♦ 3,756 Certifications

In comparison, in Q1 of 2018–19:

- ◆ R&L registrations are 10.4% lower
- R&L certifications are 8.5% lower





'Other' qualifications

- ♦ 11,041 registrations
- ♦ 12,703 qualifications

In comparison to Q1 of 2018–19:

- Registrations for other qualifications have decreased by 20.4%
- Certifications for other qualifications have increased by 3.5%


2.4 Analysis by awarding body

There are currently 39 awarding bodies approved by SQA Accreditation. The number of qualifications offered by each awarding bodies varies greatly. The five largest awarding bodies, in terms of qualifications offered are:

SVQs


SQA continues to have the highest number of SVQ registrations and certifications:

- ♦ 76% of registrations
- ♦ 77% of certifications

Regulatory and Licensing


Highfield Awards accounted for the highest number of R&L registrations and certifications:

- ♦ 46% of registrations
- ♦ 45% of certifications



The awarding body with the highest rates of registrations and certifications in Q1 was BIIAB (with 40%, and 41%, respectively)

'Other' qualifications




NEBOSH continues to have the highest number of 'Other' registrations and certifications:


- ♦ 24% of registrations
- ♦ 25% of certifications

2.5 Analysis by developer


This section compares the registrations and certifications by developer across the three qualification types.



SVQs are favoured across a wide range of developers. Skills for Care and Development account for the largest proportion of SVQ registrations and certifications -22.1% and 21.6%, respectively.



Compared to SVQs, Regulatory & Licensing qualifications are offered by a smaller range of developers, and are largely in the Security and First Aid sectors. People 1st and other Awarding Bodies account for the largest proportion of registrations and certifications — 30.8% and 31.3%, respectively.




While a wide range of organisations develop 'Other' qualifications across different industries, the majority of registrations can be attributed to a small number of developers, and hence a small number of sectors. The largest proportion of registrations and certifications are in qualifications developed by the First Aid Awarding Organisation Forum — 27.5% of registrations and 28% of certifications.

2.6 Analysis by area of competence

SQA Accreditation assign qualifications to one of the following 11 areas of competence:

- 001 Tending Animals, Plants and Land
- 002 Extracting and Providing Natural Resources
- ♦ 003 Constructing
- ♦ 004 Engineering
- 005 Manufacturing
- ♦ 006 Transporting
- ♦ 007 Providing Goods and Services
- 008 Providing Health, Care and Protective Services
- ♦ 009 Providing Business Services
- 010 Communicating and Entertaining
- 011 Developing and Extending Knowledge and Skill



The area with the highest number of registrations and certifications is Area 008: Providing Health, Care and Protective Services:

- ♦ 40% of registrations
- ♦ 41.2% of certifications

3 Workplace Core Skills


Workplace Core Skills are the broad, transferable skills that help to develop the main capabilities people need to be full, active and responsible members of society. Workplace Core Skills were specifically developed to assess core skills in a work environment. They contribute to employability and are a component of Modern Apprenticeships in Scotland. Each Workplace Core Skill is available at SCQF levels 3 to 6.

The five Workplace Core Skills are:

- Communication
- Information and Communication Technology
- Numeracy
- Problem Solving
- Working with Others

At the end of Q2 2018-19, there were:

- ♦ 145 accredited Workplace Core Skills
- ♦ 8,426 registrations (an increase of 1.4% compared to Q1)
- ♦ 8,348 certifications (an increase of 16% compared to Q1)

SQA continues to have the highest registrations and certifications for workplace core skills:

- ♦ 75% of registrations
- ♦ 79% of certifications
